## **Allotments**

Over the coming year the Parish Council is hoping to provide garden allotments on a parcel of land in the parish. Allotments will be close to the standard size of 10 square rods (1 rod = 5.5 yards), an ancient measurement equivalent to 302 square yards or 253 square metres. The whole area will be enclosed with rabbit proof fencing and a single standpipe will be provided for drinking water. Most of the water requirements for the allotments will be met by collecting rain water from the roofs of garden sheds.

Allotments will be rented from the Parish Council on an annual basis with rents paid in advance. Rent levels have yet to be calculated. Residents of the Parish will be given priority when allotments are allocated but other members of the public will be considered if the allotments are not fully taken up.

If you would like an allotment or would like to help with the planning of the scheme, please register your interests with the Parish Clerk.

## **Car Sharing**

Owing to the cost of running your own vehicle, it is reasonable to consider sharing a vehicle.

Colwall have set up a car club for residents of Colwall. It costs £20 per member to join and then £5.00 per month.

There is a charge £1.50 per hour for trips of up to 4 hours and less per hour for periods after 4 hours. In addition there is a charge of 15p per mile.

**Lengthsman** If you have any jobs for the lengthsman please let the clerk know. The lengthsman can clear gulleys, grips and drains, dig out ditches as well as other roadside maintenance.

**Comprehensive spending Review.** The spending review sets out real terms reductions of 28% in local authority budgets over the next 4 years. **Council Tax.** £700m has been set aside to allow councils to set a zero council tax increase for 2011—2012, and for councils taking up this offer, the funding will be built into grants for the next 4 years to enable a freeze in council tax by councils receiving a 2.5% grant. Fire/Police are included. Details not yet finalised.

It is clear that in future the Local Authorities will not be able to deliver many services in the way it has in the past and realistic conversations need to be had with the local community.
