Good news from the P3 scheme

Work is also well underway in cutting back hedge growth from stiles and signposts, so your access should be easier. I am delighted that several of our new council members have joined me on the checking and maintenance scheme, so between us we should make significant improvements over the year. The Iron Room is a valuable resource rented by the Parish Council for use by residents of the Dormington and Mordiford Group of Parishes. It lies on the left hand side of the road as it leads from Priors Frome towards Checkley. When it first came into the hands of the Parish Council it was in a very dilapidated state and many thought it should be demolished. However, through the enthusiasm of a group of teenagers, the Iron Room has been transformed into an attractive clubhouse. Water has been laid on, the floors have been repaired, a kitchen installed and a generator connected. Unfortunately these teenagers have now grown up, are widening their horizons, and no longer need their clubhouse. The room is at present largely unused. In the past it has been used for bingo, whist drives, concerts and other such events. Although it must be admitted it is not quite ready for such events to proceed, funds from grants are available to update the building still further.

If you don't know the building and few people do, perhaps you would like to check it out to see how it might meet the requirements of your particular group for a place to meet. To facilitate this, members of the Parish Council will be enjoying a picnic there between 2.00pm and 5.00pm on Sunday 24th July. Drop in and see what you think. Park on the common and walk the 100 yards up to the Iron Room. A cup of tea or coffee, a biscuit or a slice of cake will be waiting for you.

Mordiford Green

Negotiations with the landowner are not yet complete so development is on hold. Funds for development were allocated by you, the parishioner, when you voted for the use of the Dedicated Budget last year. The Parish Council would like to hear what kind of development you would like on your Village Green bearing in mind that just £500 is available to spend this year. Would you like a flag pole, some seating, a flower border, some shrubs or what? We already have a notice board on the green!

Queen's Jubilee Celebrations

At the beginning of June next year we will be celebrating the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. Representatives of the Dormington Community, the Parish Council, parishioners, the school, parents and the Church of the Holy Rood are planning to meet to discuss how the community should celebrate this amazing occasion. Affordable Housing, Play Area and allotments.

A phone call from Tina Wood, Housing Officer at Herefordshire Council, has been received by the Parish Council to tell us that the sale of the field next to Sufton Rise for affordable housing has reached its final negotiations. Tina and Kat (from West Mercia Housing) were at the Parish Council meeting on the 7th June and presented copies of their tentative plans for the area. In addition to plans for affordable housing, plans for additional parking, a children's play area and a number of allotments were also included.

If all goes well a planning application could be submitted as early as August.

Garden Waste

You don't have to walk very far in this parish before you see fresh garden refuse dumped. Unfortunately, other than in your own garden, there are no areas where you can leave your garden waste to decompose. This practice is inconsiderate and actually illegal. An individual disposing waste in this way can be fined up to £2000.

Much of the refuse deposited could be dealt with in the gardener's own garden, by making compost. Compost bins are available through the County Council for as little as £8 (plus £5 for delivery). As long as thought and a little time is given, good quality compost can be made out of garden refuse. Lawn mowings can be used as long as they are mixed with more open, fibrous, material.

Some items of plant material are not suitable for the compost bin. For example, the heavy prunings of an evergreen hedge should not go in. They can be dealt with at the County Council's recycling plant at Rotherwas. There they have a very large compost maker Much higher temperatures are reached and the material is constantly aerated. High quality compost is produced and is available from the Rotherwas depot.

If you have green material which you can not compost yourself, you can deliver it for processing at the depot, free of charge.

The County Council does operate a green bag system to collect garden refuse but unfortunately this material goes into landfill sites and is not recycled. Green bags are collected at the same time as other refuse. You can obtain green bags from Garrick House in Hereford. They cost 60p each to cover the cost of handling the contents.

Herefordshire Council do not allow the use of black bags to dispose of garden refuse.

Review of Herefordshire's subsidised bus network and community transport – Have your say

Herefordshire Council is facing significant budget pressures due to central government funding cuts and it is having to consider how best to support bus services in the future. The council also wants to explore the role of community transport to see if it can provide greater support for the areas and people that conventional bus services can't reach.

To help inform how these services may change, a consultation is being held with the public starting from 17 June 2011 and closing on 15 July 2011.

This consultation is seeking your views and priorities for bus services in Herefordshire. If the County Council is unable to achieve all of the required savings through contract efficiencies they may need to consider some service reductions or withdrawal. They want to take into account your priorities to help determine the best course of action and to ensure that any changes to the bus network support those priorities.

You can provide your views by downloading the consultation form and returning it to the freepost address identified on the form or alternatively you can complete it online.

Milk, bread, icecream, tea coffee, sugar, eggs, fruit, bicuits and sweet are also available. The Tea shop has a five****star rating from the council. I beg you to please use this local facility. If we don't use it we will lose it again and then we will not get it back. You may think the basics are more expensive than the supermarket but what about your petrol costs to go and get it? Have you been into the Post Office in High Town lately? The queues are a mile long. It is a nightmare. Come on Mordifordians, use your local shop and Post Office. If we use it, Lulu Young may be able to get the shop hours extended and also the Post Office. It is up to us.
