Chairman's Annual Report 2011-2012

It is a pleasure to present my second annual report as Chairman of your Parish Council. Following the elections in May 2011, the newly elected Councillors quickly settled in and have already contributed significantly. They bring a fresh approach and have been good at challenging the status quo. I am particularly personally grateful for the support of Melanie Preedy, our Parish Clerk, Ray Dickson, Vice-Chair, and all Councillors while I was incapacitated during my recent series of eye operations. Thank you all!

Like most years, we have made good progress in some areas and less in others. Sadly, we did not receive sufficient interest in using the Iron Room as a community venue. This is frustrating as much time and effort has been put into bringing the building to a certain standard, but more work still needs to be done. We have decided to maintain the lease for another year and hope that we can find a sustainable solution. Equally, we have had a delay on being able to adopt and 'beautify' the 'Village Green' opposite the Moon at Mordiford. We hope that this will now proceed this year.

However, excellent progress has been made with the Affordable Housing Development at Sufton Rise. West Mercia Housing, Herefordshire Council Planning Department, the Parish Council and local residents have worked positively together to develop and refine the plans, based on residents' views and planning/drainage requirements. We are now very close to the final project being submitted for planning approval which will be a further opportunity for you to have your input. This single project will deliver three key 'wishes' identified by you in the Parish Plan - affordable housing, play area and allotments.

Of course, less glamorous day-to-day-activities still have to be done and we have tried to promptly respond to planning applications, requests for highway repairs, footpath maintenance and jobs for the lengthsman. With increasing emphasis on the Big Society and 'local democracy', the role of the Parish Council is changing. We will undoubtedly be expected to take on new responsibilities and a good example of this is our cooperation with Fownhope Parish Council to reinstate the bus service from Sufton Rise to Ross. The first bus received wide publicity on TV, radio and in the Hereford Times and although the service is only once a month, it really is a case of 'use it or lose it'. I hope you will support this initiative which is being watched nationally as an example of 'localism' at work.

Finally, as I said last year, please remember that we are your representatives. We are always pleased to welcome members of the public at our monthly meetings and your feedback to our regular newsletter 'The Dragon', through the Clerk or any Councillor. The year ahead brings plenty of excitement and opportunity, not least the local Diamond Jubilee celebrations, and we look forward to your continuing support, participation and encouragement.

"WYE VALLEY VIEWS" WYE VALLEY AREA OF OUTSTANDING NATURAL BEAUTY (AONB) PHOTOGRAPHIC JIGSAW PROJECT 2012

This is an innovative project involving and covering the 40 Town/Parish/Community Councils that make up the **Wye Valley Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty** (AONB). The Project aims to find out what local people think about the Wye Valley: what you think is important about it, what **you value**, what makes it special to you and what you think should be conserved and enhanced. In essence what makes Wye Valley important and different to you. The Wye Valley is not only important locally but nationally, which is why the landscape is protected and designated an **Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty** (AONB). "Wye Valley Views Jigsaw Project" was first carried out in 2001 and fed into the first statutory AONB Management Plan in (2004-9). Repeating it 10 years on will provide a record of local people's interest and knowledge and how the landscape and local perceptions of it have changed in a decade.
